Introduction

This report on statistics is published annually as a complement to the operational and financial reviews covered in the annual report of the Workers' Compensation Board of B.C.

WCB 2001 Statistics contains statistics on three key areas of operation: claims, assessments, and prevention. This information provides both a general overview of the workers' compensation system, and trends of key statistical indicators. To allow for valid comparisons, the format of the tables and exhibits has been kept as consistent as possible with those used in previous editions of this report.

In February 2000, the Workers' Compensation Board revised the system it uses to classify employers into classes and subclasses of industry. For administrative purposes, the revised classes are now known as sectors, and the revised subclasses are now known as subsectors. When the new classification structure was introduced, historical records were converted to the new structure. It is therefore possible in *WCB 2001 Statistics* to publish statistical time series on a subsector basis.

There are a series of tables presented by subsector in *WCB 2001 Statistics* that were presented by subclass in *Statistics 1999* and prior publications. These tables are: Table A-1, Number of Claims First Paid in 2001 by Type of Claim and Subsector; Table A-1, Historical by Subsector; Table A-1, Number of Fatalities, 10-year Counts of Fatal Claims by Subsector; Table A-2, Claim

Costs Charged by Subsector and Type of Claim; Table B-1, Days Lost and Accident Type by Subsector; and Table B-2, Injury Rates and Claim Durations by Subsector. The Classes of Industry section, starting on page 53, lists the types of industrial activities that make up each subsector.

Since the introduction of the new classification system, a number of employers have been reclassified into new subsectors. In *WCB 2001 Statistics*, the experience of these employers prior to their reclassification is tabulated in the subsectors the employers were originally assigned to, and the experience of these employers following their reclassifications is tabulated in the subsectors they have been reclassified into. The impact of the reclassifications is very minor at the subsector level.

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Claim Statistics

Reported Claims

The number of claims reported to the WCB in 2001 was 172,103 — a 6.5 percent decrease from the 184,131 claims reported in 2000.

First payment was made for 168 occupational deaths in 2001. Seventeen of the 168 cases were pensioners who died from causes related to their compensable injuries or diseases. The 168 fatal claims first paid in 2001 cannot be compared to the 193 fatalities in the above chart because some of the fatalities first paid in 2001 occurred in and were reported in a prior year, and because some of the reported fatalities are not compensable. The 193 fatal claims tabulated in the above chart are broken down in the table on the opposite page. The 168 fatal claims first paid in 2001 are broken down by subsector in Table A-1.

Number and Costs of Claims

During the year 2001, 130,323 claims were paid for the first time. Of those:

- 61,989 were health-care-only claims (formerly called medical-aid-only claims)
- 64,165 were short-term disability claims (formerly called wage-loss claims)
- 4,001 were long-term disability claims (formerly called permanent disability claims)
- 168 were fatal claims

In 2001, the WCB set aside \$4,026,254 in capitalized values of pension awards for long-term disability benefits on hearing-loss claims.

Compensation costs totalled \$994,522,829 in 2001, compared to \$978,392,175 in 2000. The figures include health care benefits, vocational rehabilitation benefits, short-term disability benefits, and capitalized values of pension awards, which are reserves set aside for present and future payments of long-term disability benefits and survivor benefits. The 2001 figure excludes the \$694,321 increase in widows' pension entitlement as ruled by the B.C. Supreme Court, and the 2000 figure excludes \$5,948,941 for that reason. The benefit liabilities figures shown in Note 7 of the *WCB 2001 Annual Report* are calculated on a different basis and are not comparable to these total compensation costs.

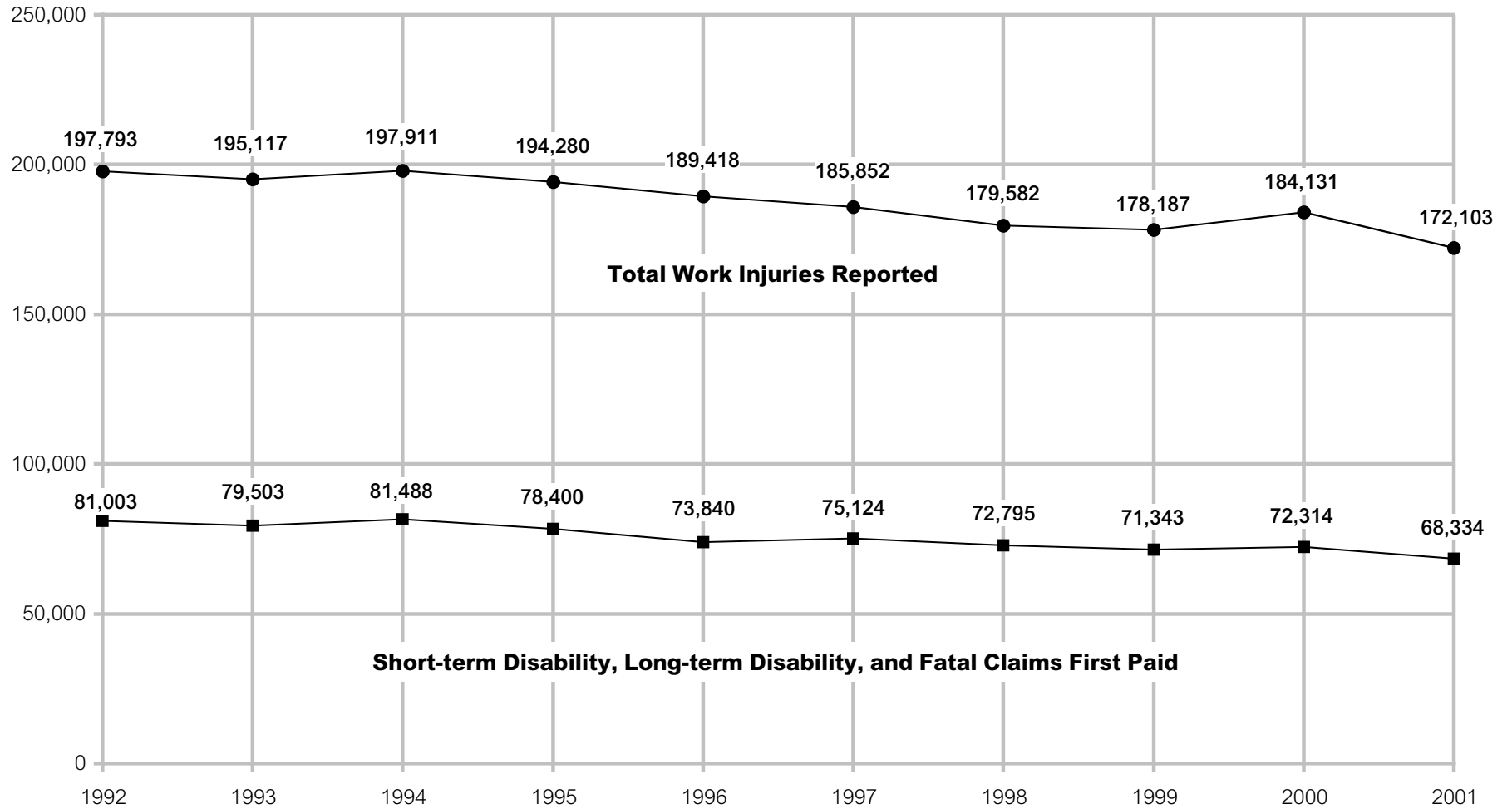

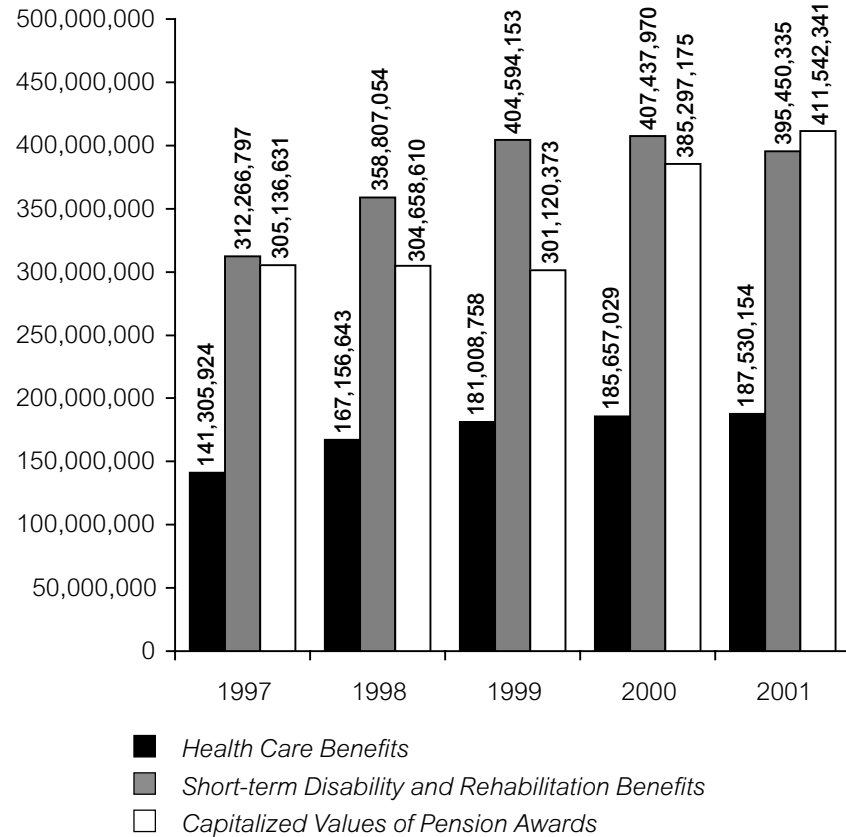

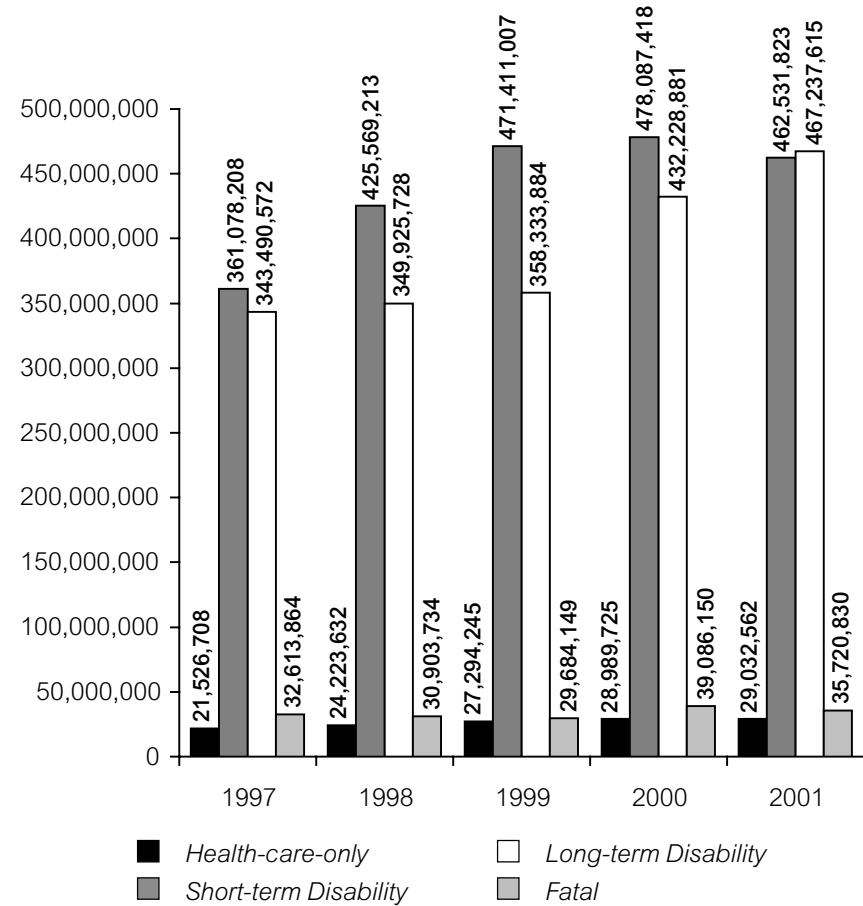


Compensation Cost by Type of Benefit

Key Indicators in *WCB 2001 Statistics*

This series of charts of 10-year trends of statistical indicators first appeared in the *WCB 1992 Statistics* report. Although none of the indicators has changed dramatically from one year to the next, over the last 10 years there have been some significant trends.

In 1994, Bill 63 covered a number of industry groups for the first time under the *Workers Compensation Act*. The 10-year charts in this section include the Bill 63 industries for each of the 10 years to make the 10-year trend valid. (The statistics for the 1992–1993 period have been adjusted to reflect what they likely would have been if Bill 63 had been in effect since 1992.) The five-year trend shown in Table B-2 is also on the “including Bill 63” basis.

The first chart shows claim duration as measured in days per claim. Five components of duration are shown on the chart: days lost per claim in the injury year, and days lost per claim in each of the four years following the injury year. This is the Association of Workers' Compensation Boards of Canada (AWCBC) recommended method of showing duration that Canadian compensation systems have adopted as a standard. The chart indicates that duration has generally increased since 1992, but turned down in 2000.

The second chart shows that one of WCB's most important statistical indicators — the injury rate — has declined steadily since 1992. The injury rate is the number of short-term disability claims per one 100 person-years of covered

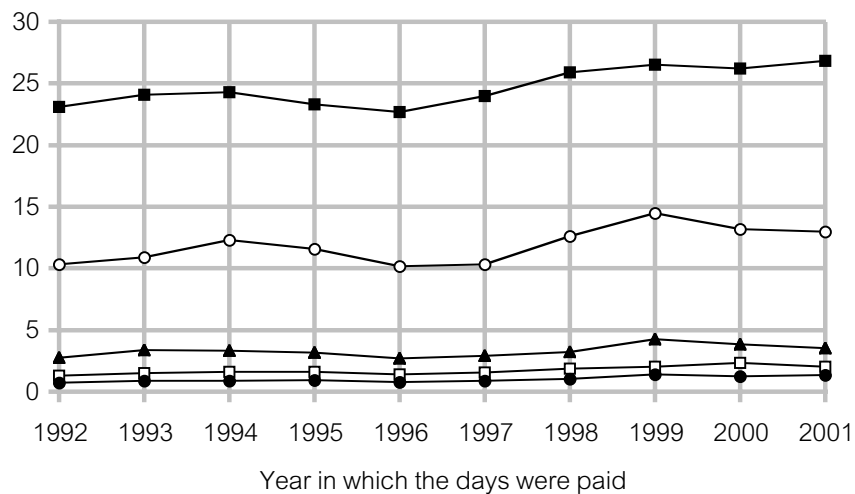
employment (100 person-years is equivalent to 100 full-time employees). For the purpose of the injury rate calculation, the number of “short-term disability” claims is the number of claims accepted for short-term disability, long-term disability, or survivor benefits either in the year of injury or in the first quarter of the following year. The estimates of person-years are based on gross payrolls that covered employers report to the Board.

The third indicator — the fatality rate — is related to the second indicator. The fatality rate is the number of accepted fatal claims per 100 person-years of covered employment. The fatality rate has turned up in the last few years, but still shows an overall downward trend over the past 10 years.

The fourth chart shows the percentage of short-term disability claims represented by claimants whose injuries were back strains. Back strains have accounted for approximately 25 percent of all short-term disability claims for each year in the past 10 years. It is the type of injury the WCB sees most often.

The last two charts reflect shifts in the population of covered workers. The fifth chart shows that the percentage of female claimants has increased from 24 percent in 1992 to 30 percent in 2001; the sixth chart shows that the percentage of claimants younger than 25 years of age has decreased from 18 percent in 1992 to 16 percent in 2001.

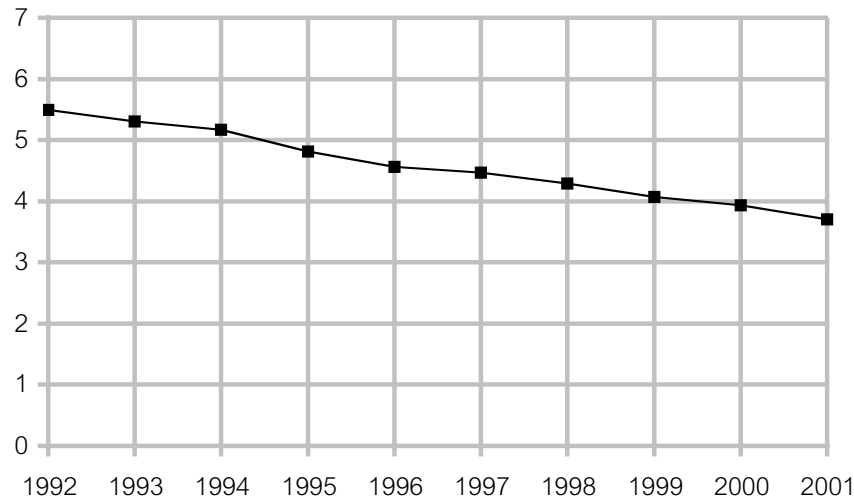
Number of days paid per claim

- Days paid per claim in the fourth year after the injury year

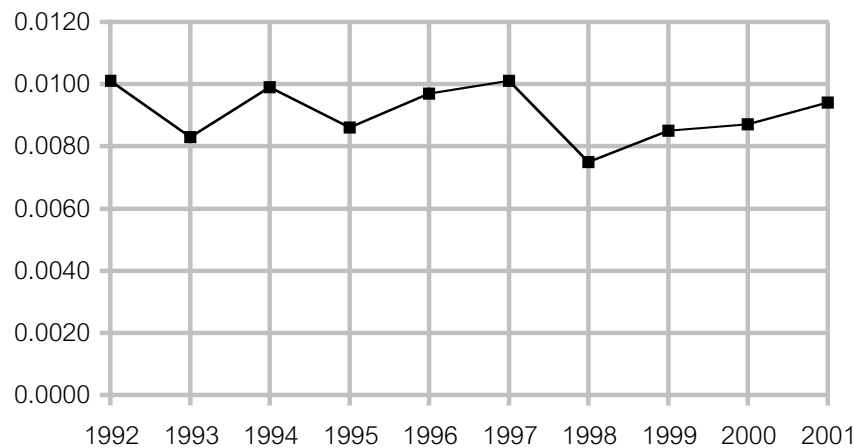
Injury rate (number of short-term disability claims per 100 person-years of WCB-covered employment)

Includes the Bill 63 industries for all years.

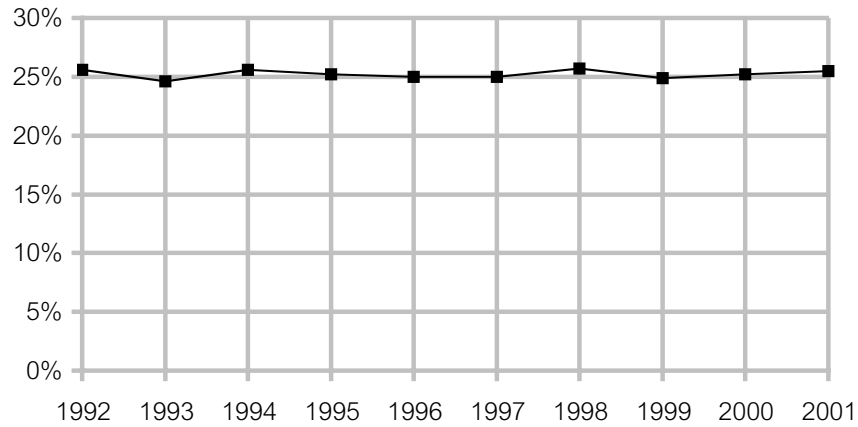


Fatality rate (number of accepted fatal claims per 100 person-years of WCB-covered employment)

Includes the Bill 63 industries for all years.

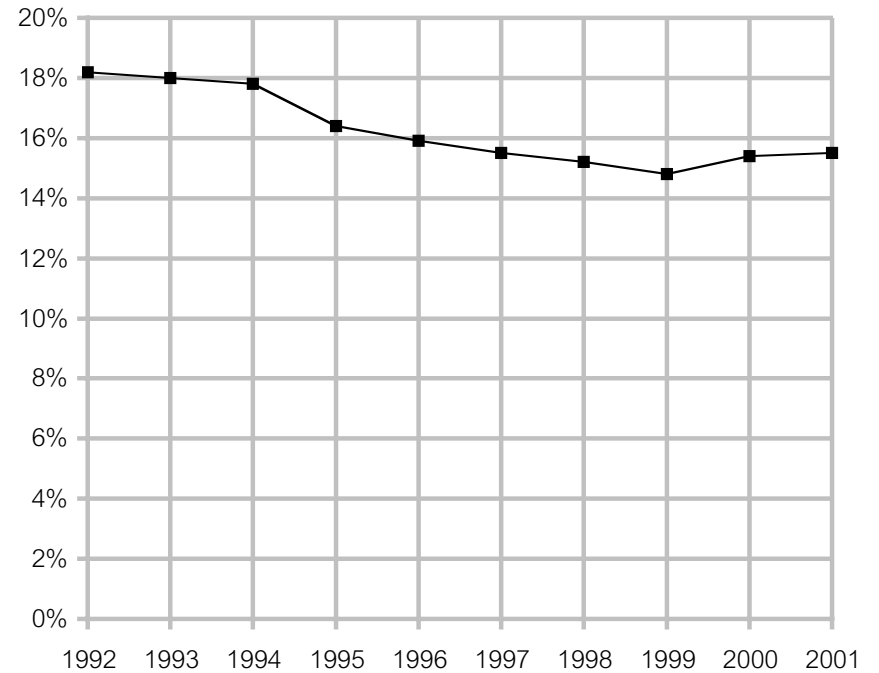


Percentage of claimants with back strains



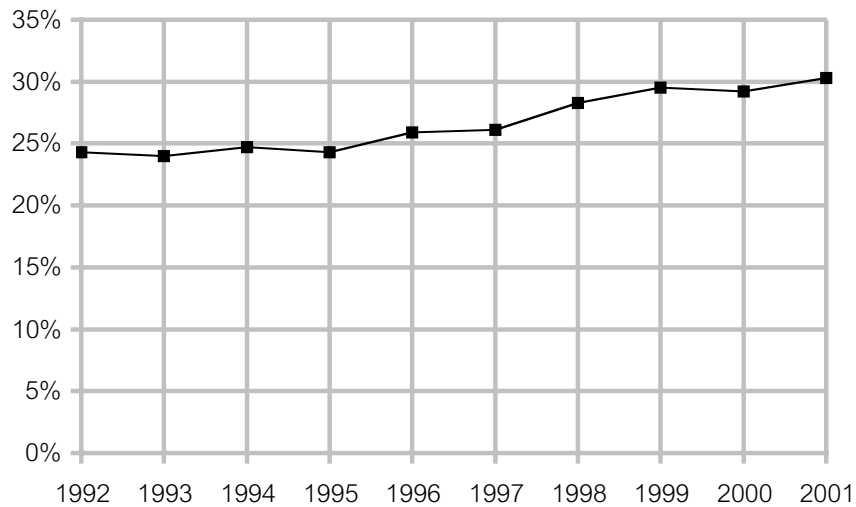
Based on claimants receiving a first payment of short-term disability or long-term disability benefits in these years

Days Lost From Work

There were 3,370,562 days lost from work during 2001 due to occupational injuries and diseases. The “days lost” in 2001 are the days paid in 2001 on current year and prior years’ injuries. Of the 3,370,562 days paid in 2001, 49.6 percent resulted from injuries and diseases that occurred in 2001, 27.6 percent resulted from injuries and diseases that occurred in 2000, and 22.8 percent resulted from injuries and diseases that occurred in 1999 and prior years.

The following is an analysis by sector and subsector of the days lost in the 1997–2001 period. The sectors and subsectors are described in “Classes of Industry” on page 53.

The first payment of short-term disability, long-term disability, or survivor benefits was made on 68,334 claims during the year 2001, a decrease of 5.5 percent from the number made in 2000. Of these claimants, 70 percent were men and 30 percent were women.

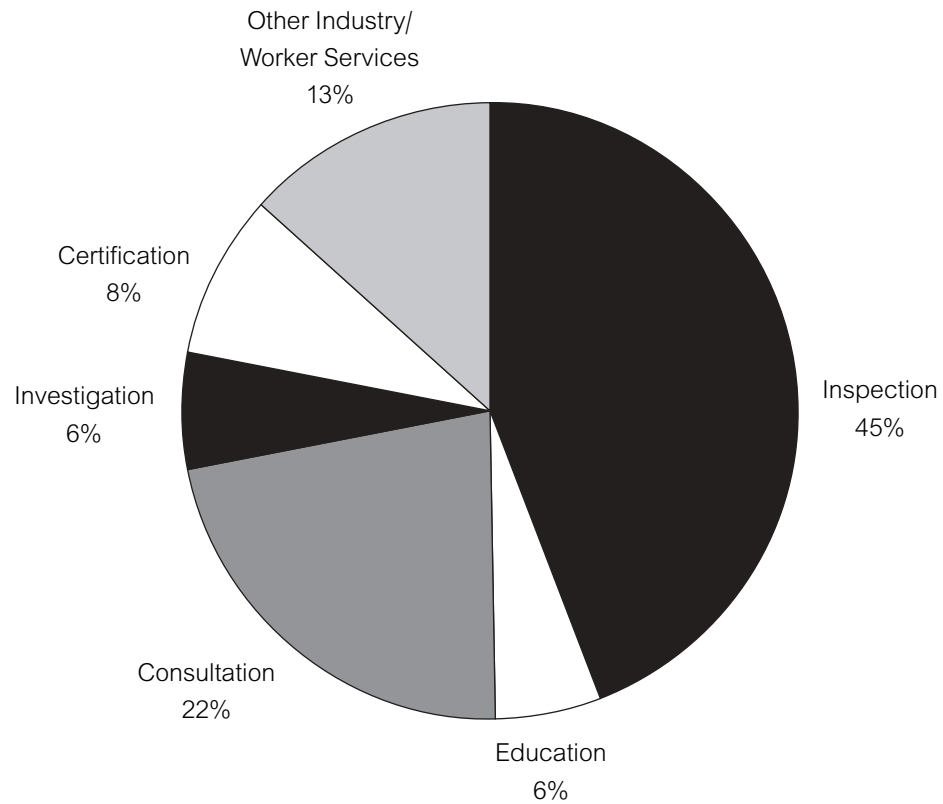

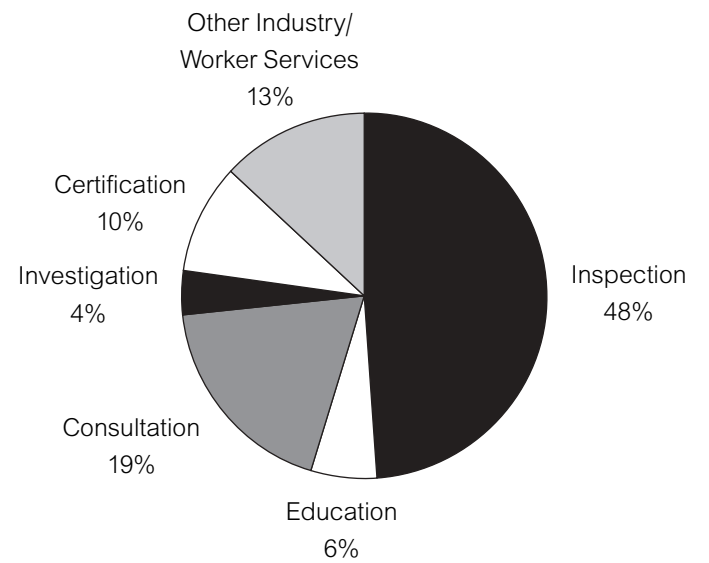

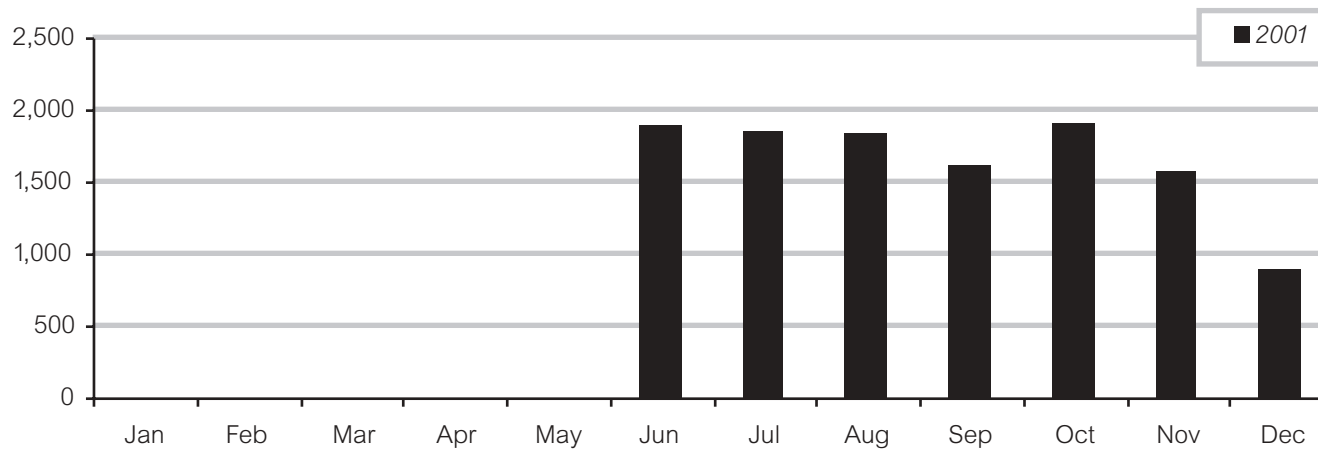

Prevention Division Reception — Number of Calls Received



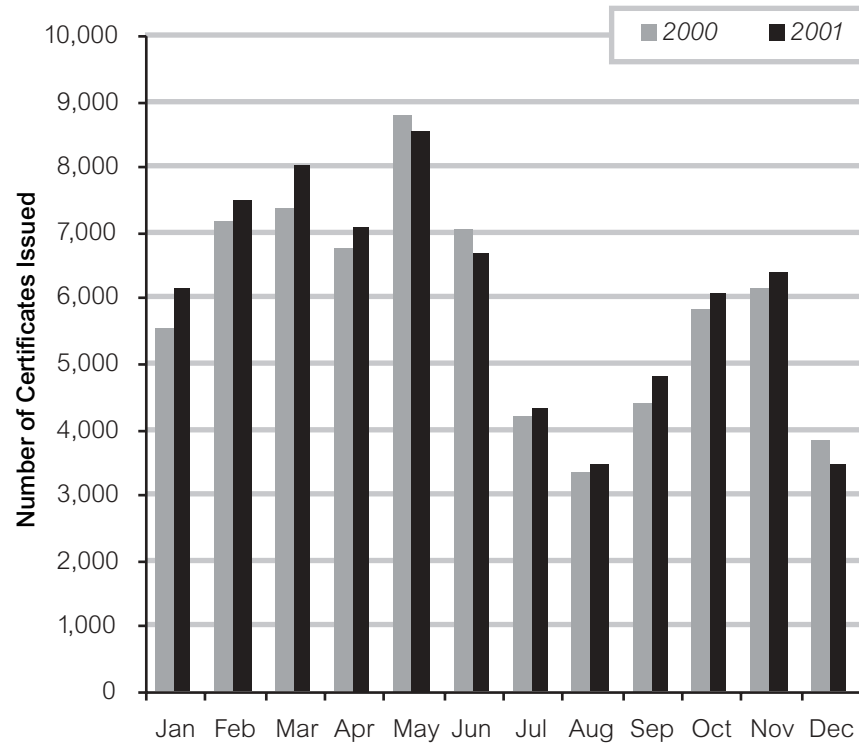
Message Centre — Number of Calls Handled



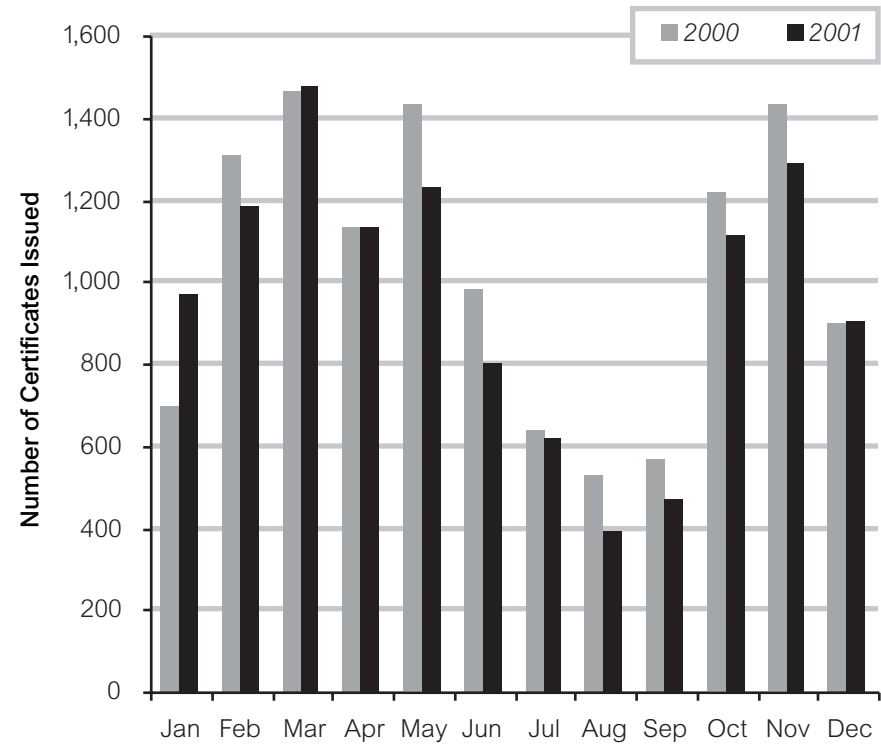
The Message Centre provides an avenue for callers to ask questions and receive responses from experts including Prevention Officers and specialized units. It was implemented in June 2001.

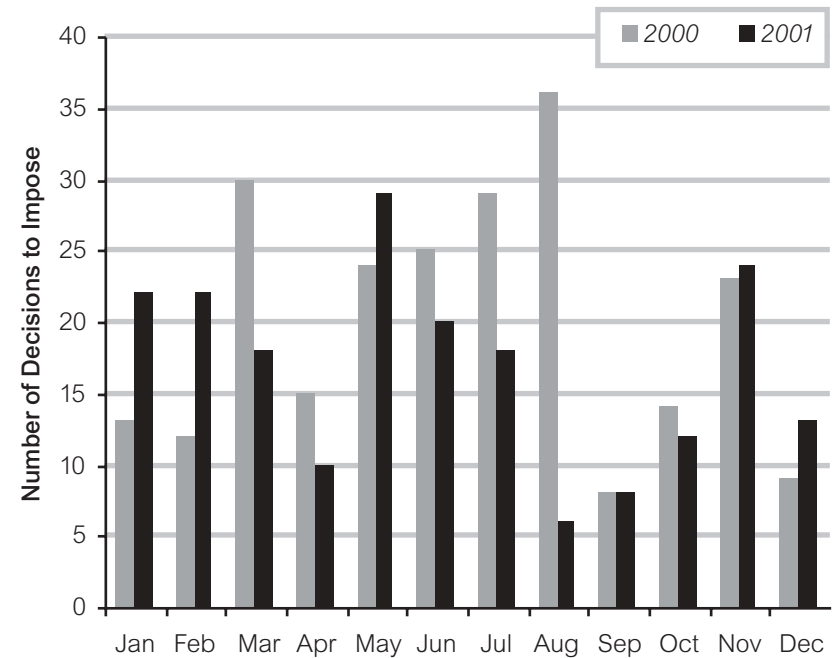
