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## Streamlining the process

### *We've made minor changes to your remittance form*

When you opened this envelope, you may have noticed that your Employer Remittance Form looks different. We've streamlined the process for filling out and submitting the form. The changes are minor, but they'll help ensure that we get all the information we need to calculate your rate accurately.

Please check the small number on the left side of your form, just above the perforation.

If it says 1820S, you no longer have to transfer the total assessable payroll figure (C) to the payment stub at the bottom. Here's what you need to do:

- **If you pay by mail:** Return the entire form — the top portion as well as the payment stub — to WorkSafeBC (the WCB) using the envelope provided.
- **If you pay at your bank:** Return the payment stub to your bank, and send the top portion to us in the envelope provided or fax it to us at **604 244-6490** or toll-free at **1 888 992-6622**.
- **If you report and pay online or by automated phone system:** You do not need to return any part of the form to us.

(If the number on your form says 1820M instead of 1820S, there are no changes to the remittance process; continue to submit your forms as you always have.)

You can report your payroll and pay your premiums online at **WorkSafeBC.com** or by calling our automated phone system at **604 244-6181** or toll-free at **1 888 922-2768**.

## Lower rates projected for 2006

WorkSafeBC (the WCB) is proposing a 3.5 percent decrease in the overall premium rate for employers for 2006, from \$1.97 in 2005 to \$1.90 in 2006.

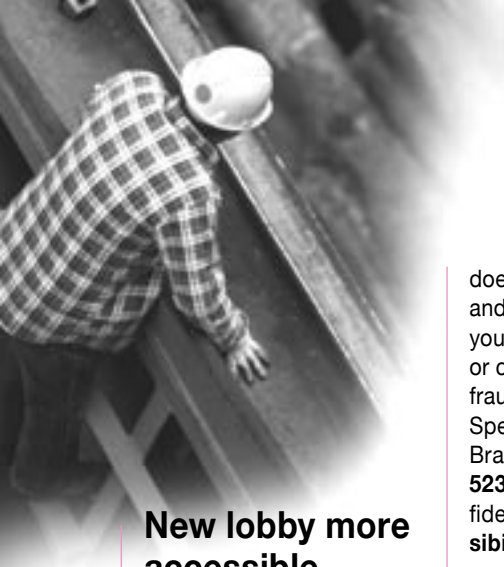
Overall, approximately 60 percent of employers will see their base rate decrease or remain the same. Hospitals, long-term care and short-term care facilities, as well as wharf, marine terminal, and stevedoring operations, will see a 30 percent rate reduction. Other industries that will witness significant rate reductions are shipbuilding, universities, electric utilities, supermarkets, and industrial construction and trades.

Rate increases are forecast for general retail, public school districts, department stores, telecommunication services, gas utilities, and general trucking. Trucking does not include dump truck operators, who will see a five percent decrease in rates.

"This is a relatively good news story for B.C. employers because their rates are among the lowest in Canada," says WorkSafeBC chief financial officer Sid Fattedad. In recent years, WorkSafeBC has maintained stable premium rates for employers, at a time when insurance rates for both workers' compensation and general insurance in North America have typically been on the rise.

"Premiums are driven by injury costs," adds Fattedad. "Industries can lower their rates by improving safety and return-to-work programs with effective disability management." To that end, WorkSafeBC has worked with industry to establish safety associations in forestry, construction, agriculture, and the oil and gas industries, and has developed sector-based business teams to work closely with industry and labour groups.
