Searching for work? We can help

If you've been injured at work, and are receiving employment guidance through our vocational rehabilitation program, we're here to help. Try our Job Finder online search tool. You can use this handy resource to find out more about what kinds of jobs are available, and search for specific job opportunities according to posting dates, job types, and job locations.

How to use Job Finder

To view a list of currently available jobs, log on to worksafebc.com, and follow these steps:

1. Visit "Workers" under the "Customer Centres" section.
2. Select "Vocational rehabilitation job finder" from the "Returning to work" section.
3. Select the "Find a Job" button.
4. Enter your WorkSafeBC claim number and personal access number (PAN).
5. Select the "Submit" button.

Once you've arrived on the site, you can narrow or broaden your search by occupation, geographic region, salary range, and date range. Keep in mind that the postings include job titles, geographic areas, and starting salaries, but don't include employers' names.

If you're interested in a particular job, make note of the job ID number, and contact your vocational rehabilitation consultant (VRC) to discuss the specific job requirements. If the job is a good match for you, your VRC can talk with you about starting the application process.

To speed things up, please ensure you have an updated resumé. If necessary, your VRC can help you prepare your resumé. We can also help you if the employer requests an interview.

How to successfully search for a job

Job Finder is just one tool to help you look for a job. You'll want to try a number of strategies. Here are some tips on how to conduct an effective job search:

- Make finding work a full-time job.
- Identify realistic work goals.
- Network. Talk to friends, family, associates, people in coffee shops, and business owners. Ask if they know who is hiring.
- Whenever possible, contact employers directly.
- Answer ads, fill out application forms, and send out cover letters and resumé.
- Look for job leads using a variety of resources such as Chamber of Commerce directories, professional association directories, business and trade association (union) directories, volunteer organizations, churches, social agencies, trade and business magazines, newspapers, the library, WorkBC Centres, and online job boards.
- Set up information interviews to find out what skills, training, and knowledge are important for jobs you're interested in.
- Have a well-prepared cover letter and resumé.
- Be prepared for interviews; know something about the company to which you're applying.
- Have a system for follow-up (e.g., phone calls, emails, or thank-you notes).
- Above all, stay motivated.

Our job search programs

Job Finder is part of our Employment Development and Placement (EDAP) strategy, designed to help injured workers find and secure employment.

This strategy includes two programs — Job Finder, which provides injured workers' access to online job searches, and Hire a Worker, which allows employers to submit job opportunities to WorkSafeBC.

The Hire a Worker program offers employers cost incentives to help offset hiring and training costs. These incentives can include a brief, fully funded work assessment; a cost-shared, on-the-job training program; worksite modifications; and/or tuition costs for job-related courses.
