# YoungWorkers 6-minute safety talk for woodworkers

# **Instructor Guide**

## **Tools**

**Topic Overview** (why the topic is important to the students)
The tools of the trade for woodworkers, from hand tools to power screwdrivers, sanders and saws all have the potential to cause serious injury.
Note: This is just an overview - specific safety instruction should be provided with training on each tool and piece of equipment.

## **Demonstration and Discussion Topics**

- □ **Discuss** the various tools that present hazards in the shop.
- □ **Tour the shop** with the students, pointing out the hazards.
- □ **Distribute** the student handout.
- Review the safety tips.
- Explain what can be done in the workplace to minimize the risk of injury from various tools (e.g., good tool maintenance, written safe work procedures, work stations arranged to reduce the risk of injury).
- Make it real. Tell at least two stories of injuries from your experience or use the following example:
  - A woodworker was assembling a piece of furniture. The head of the hammer, which was loose, flew off, striking a co-worker in the face and causing him to lose vision in one eye.

- **Discuss** the attitude that "it won't happen to me". Remind them that an injury can and will happen if they take shortcuts or are careless.
- ☐ Instruct the students to identify and report any safety concerns about tools.
- □ Answer any questions or concerns they might have.
- Set a good example by working safely at all times.
